

About the Survey

This study was conducted on the **9th-10th of April 2020** to reveal how Spark communities are currently affected by the COVID-19 pandemic and to assess impacts on their livelihoods and social cohesion. It also analyzes the spread of information, communication channels, spread and symptoms, and how these effects present immediate and long-term challenges for community members.

Study Demographics

This is a small sample size of 121 respondents from Burera, Gakenke, Gisagara, Musanze, and Rulindo Districts. It should not be considered representative of Rwanda's population, or Districts' population.

This data could be used to verify or sense-check other, larger data sets or observations, and inform targeted programming or additional research.

Respondents were people from Spark villages who already owned cell phones and had their numbers registered with Spark's SMS messaging platform, thus may not be representative of their broader community.



Communication and Information Dissemination

How have you received information about COVID-19? To what extent do you trust information from these sources?



99% of men and 98% of women report recieving information by radio. Radio is the most common method to receive information and is trusted by over 95% of respondents



There are lower levels of trust in messages received via social media (42%) and whatsapp (21%)



Over 90% of respondents trust information received from National Government, Local Government, over Radio, and from Spark.



Women report using, and trusting, social media and whatsapp less than men, but receive significantly more information from friends and family than men

Hunger/Famine: "It seems like many people will die from hunger instead of being killed by COVID-19...Really I am worried by the upcoming months'
